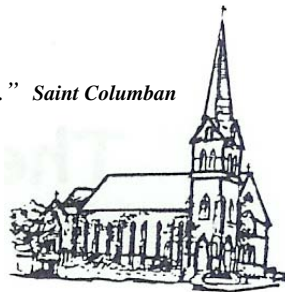

## Compunction

The readings at daily Mass during Lent are divided into two parts. The first, including Ash Wednesday and the rest of the week through Saturday of the Third week of Lent, are taken from Matthew, Mark and Luke with a corresponding reading from the Old Testament. The message these selections proclaim is a call to a life of Gospel conversion. The selections speak of beginning anew; of fasting, prayer and almsgiving; of mutual forgiveness; hardness of heart; love of ones' enemies; absolute claims of justice and love; and the call to holiness of life.

The readings for daily Mass for the second half of Lent, beginning with Monday of the Fourth week and going through chapter 13 of Saint John, present not so much a little course in the life of Jesus as a presentation of the mystery of Christ, the Son of God, of whom the beloved disciple proclaims all who believe in him will have eternal life. Jesus is presented as the healer and life giver, as the one who gives life as a result of his victory over sin and death and who unites into one the scattered children of God.

These two sections of the lectionary's readings deal with our ethical response to the Gospel and our Christological response to the Christian faith proclaimed. This is no accident. The purpose of the first part of Lent is to bring us to compunction. Compunction has the same root as the verb "to puncture" and suggests the deflation of our inflated egos, a challenge to our often self-deceptive ideas about the quality of our lives as disciples of Jesus. By hitting us time and time again with demands which we will fail to obey,

and which we come to recognize as beyond our capacity, the Gospel accounts are meant to trouble us to challenge the way we live our lives and confront our illusions about ourselves. "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

From the perspective of compunction, our Lenten penance may be more effective if we fail in our resolutions than if we succeed, for its purpose is not to confirm us in our sense of virtue, but to bring home to us our radical need for salvation.

It is in answer to this profound awareness of need that the readings shift from Matthew, Mark and Luke to Saint John; from the demands of discipleship to the person of Jesus. John presents Jesus as the Savior, but Jesus can only save those who know their need for salvation. Confronted with our powerlessness, we pray for our salvation.

## Remember, You Are Dust

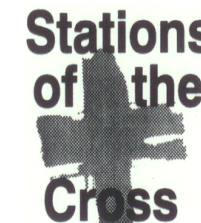
Our annual Lenten pilgrimage to Easter begins Ash Wednesday, February 22, with the imposition of ashes and Mass celebrated at 9 am and 7 pm. ## Lenten Dietary Regulations

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are Days of Fast and Abstinence for Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59. On Fast Days, one full meal and two lesser meals which together do not equal a full meal may be taken. On Days of Abstinence, no meat may be consumed. All Fridays of Lent are Days of Abstinence from meat for all Catholics over the age of 14. Liquids are always permitted on days of fast and abstinence.

## Lenten Fish Fry

The Knights of Columbus are sponsoring a Lenten Fish Fry EVERY Friday in Lent, February 24 - March 30, from 4:30 - 6:30 pm. Fish, shrimp, and grilled cheese dinners will be available, as well as individual fish, fish tail, and grilled cheese sandwiches.



Stations of the Cross will be celebrated publically in our Parish each Friday during Lent at 7 pm. As it is not necessary for a priest to lead this devotion, Father will make the Station booklets available in Church on Fridays for those who wish to pray this devotion in honor of Christ's Passion.

*General Intention:* That many young people may hear the call of Christ and follow him in the priesthood and religious life.

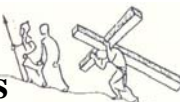
*Mission Intention:* That the risen Christ may be a sign of certain hope for the men and women of the African continent.

Thanks to a new tradition we started last year, my family thinks Lent is fun.

**Why do Catholics believe in angels?**



The belief in angels is a Catholic doctrine, based on evidence from the Bible. Scripture records instances in which God sent angels to announce his will, to correct, punish, teach, rebuke, console (Psalms 102:20; Matthew 4:11; 13:49; 26:53).

The Church teaches that angels are bodiless creatures who possess an intelligence and free will beyond that of the human. The word "angel" comes from the Greek word, "angelos," or messenger because they bring God's power and message to Earth.

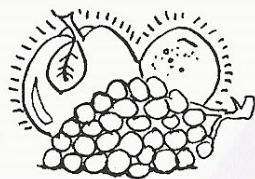


## Thoughtful Moments

When we cooperate with God's grace, we produce fruits of that grace:

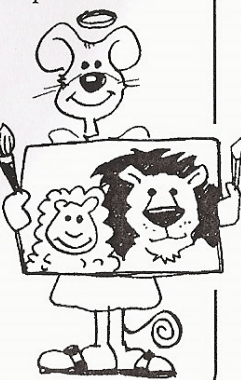
charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control, chastity (CCC, 1832). Pick a different "fruit" each month to produce as a family.



### When bad things happen

It can be hard to explain to a child why a loving God lets bad things happen. In fact, sometimes adversity can draw us closer to him. Refer to the Old Testament hero Joseph. He was sold into slavery by his own brothers, falsely accused by his master's wife, and unjustly imprisoned for years. Eventually he was released and became one of the most powerful men in Egypt.

Adversity made Joseph's friendship with God strong. When his brothers asked for his forgiveness, he said, *"Even though you meant harm to me, God meant it for good, to achieve his present end, the survival of many people."* (Genesis 50:20)



## Celebrate the traditions of Lent



Lent is a gift the Church gives us so we can experience the full joy of Easter. Some of the season's traditional practices remind us that prayer, fasting and alms-giving lead to renewal.

**Mardi Gras:** Translated as "Fat Tuesday," Mardi Gras is a final celebration before Lent. It began as an attempt to use up rich foods forbidden during Lent and people feasted on such items as pancakes, sausages, and sweets. Have a Mardi Gras party and pancake supper with your family the night before Ash Wednesday.

**Meatless Friday:** Abstaining from meat on Fridays is a sacrifice as penance for sin. It is also a sign of solidarity with the hungry all over the world. If your children are too young to abstain from meat on Fridays during Lent (all over the age of 14 are required), suggest they abstain from something they enjoy like sweets or dessert.

**Stations of the Cross:** This is a way to reflect on the events of Jesus' journey to Calvary. Many churches display images before which families can pray while performing this devotion.


**Confession:** Jesus created the Sacrament of Reconciliation to help us remember God's unlimited mercy. Take your family to Confession so you can all know God's forgiveness and make a new start on Easter.

### Scripture LESSON John 8:1-11; the Trap

Jesus had defeated the Jewish leaders' attempts to entrap him and they went home to nurse their grudges. They returned with another test: a woman caught in the act of adultery. What would Jesus do?

If Jesus declared that she should be put to death, he would violate Roman law forbidding the Jews to administer capital punishment. If he freed her, he would violate Jewish law. As is often the case with God, Jesus did something unpredictable—he encouraged the accusers to judge themselves before judging her. The left in shame.

*What can a parent do?* Children can quickly tell when a peer has done something wrong, but may miss their own faults or mistakes. As Catholic parents, we can teach our children to examine their own behavior for areas that can be improved before we point out the misdeeds of others. And we can help them to experience often the healing grace of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. These are great opportunities to remind our children (and ourselves) of God's infinite mercy and forgiving heart.



## Thoughtful Moments

### Help with priorities

When you're feeling overwhelmed by the daily tasks of family and trying to decide what to do next, consider asking, "Will this help to

bring God's love to my family (parish, community, world)?" Keeping this focus will help to make prioritizing a little easier.

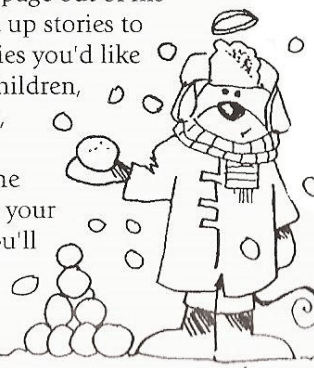


### Refresh your perspective

Once in a while, spend family time in a different room than you're used to. Have dinner on the floor in one of the children's bedrooms. Read books together in the kitchen. A change of environment can refresh the mood and the conversation.

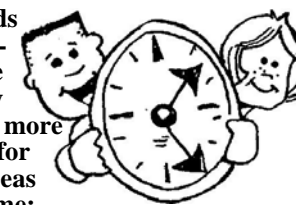
### Storytelling, Jesus' style

One of Jesus' favorite ways to make a point was to tell a story. Why not take a page out of his book and make up stories to illustrate qualities you'd like to see in your children, such as courage, honesty, and generosity. Name the heroes after your listeners and you'll really capture their attention.



## Easy ways to find more family time

With so many demands on our time, it can be difficult for us to get the whole family together for quality time. Yet there is nothing more important that we can do for our children. Try these ideas for finding more family time:



**Pick one event on your weekly schedule that you can do without and replace it with family time.**

**Pick a kids' television show or video game that you secretly like and share it regularly with your child.**

**Brush your teeth together at night.**

**Work on the family checkbook or work from your job at the same time and in the same room with your children as they do homework.**

**Get everyone up 15 minutes earlier and have breakfast as a family.**

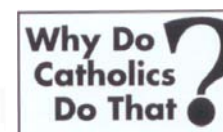
**Wash dinner dishes or do another chore together.**

**Turn off the TV, computers, iPods, and video games, and take a walk.**

**Cook something together. (Make salad if you can't cook.)**

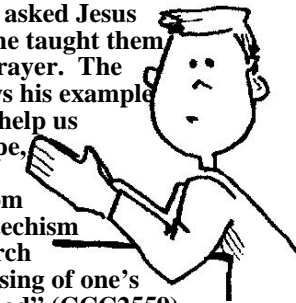
**Go to Mass as a family.**



### Why do Catholics say set prayers such as the "Our Father" or "Hail Mary"?

When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, he taught them the Our Father, a set prayer. The Catholic Church follows his example with other prayers to help us profess our faith, hope, love, and contrition.

But we also pray from our hearts. The Catechism of the Catholic Church calls prayer "the raising of one's mind and heart to God" (CCC2559). The form of the prayer doesn't matter as much as the desire for God that it expresses.



## Successful families will change the world

Pope John Paul II tells us that successful families form loving, affirming, and honoring relationships in what he calls a “civilization of love.” Such families will ultimately transform the world by their example. Here’s how to become a civilization of love:

**Communicate love.** “The family has the mission to guard, reveal, and communicate love in all it does” (Pope John Paul II, Familiaris Consortio). Your loving attention will teach your children to turn to people, not things, in times of need. And your affection helps them to experience God’s love.

**Affirm the individual.** Successful families celebrate the uniqueness of each member. One



simple way to do this is to regularly spend one-on-one time with each child. You can run errands, go for lunch, or just talk. Singling out your child for time together tells him that he is valued.

**Earn honor.** The Holy Father teaches that while the fourth commandment says to honor your father and mother, it implies that parents “should act in such a way that your life will merit the honor (and the love) of your children.” Modeling the behavior you want your child to adapt will teach your children to trust you and help them understand that God is trustworthy, too. ### **family** **FUN** Lenten Pretzels

Early Christians observed a very strict fast during Lent. They couldn’t have butter, cheese, eggs, meat, milk, or cream. So they created a bread shaped like a person’s arms crossed in prayer (a popular prayer posture at the time) to remind them that Lent was a time of prayer and penance. Sprinkled with salt, this bread was eventually called “pretzels.”

#### Recipe:

Dissolve a package of dry yeast into 1½ cups of warm water.

Add one teaspoon of salt, and one teaspoon of sugar.

Blend in two cups of whole wheat flour and two cups of enriched flour.

Knead the dough until smooth and cut into small pieces.

Roll the pieces into ropes and twist into a pretzel shape.

Place on a lightly greased cookie sheet, brush with a beaten egg, and sprinkle with sea salt.

Bake at 425° for 12-15 minutes.

## Luke 15:1-3, 11-32. We can always go home again.
















The scribes and the Pharisees were indignant when Jesus welcomed tax collectors and sinners into his company. They didn’t approve of Jesus befriending such people, especially when he was cool to the scribes and Pharisees. In response, Jesus told the famous story of two sons.

One son asked his father for his rightful share in the family estate and squandered it in a country far from home. With his money gone and his situation desperate, he returned to his father humbled and asking for mercy. Overjoyed by his son’s return, the father gives him a princely reception in the same spirit as God’s reception of us when we come home to him.

Convinced he was the “good” son however, the other brother resented the warm welcome home the prodigal got. Like the Pharisees and scribes, he was miffed at the prospect of sinners becoming acceptable to God.

What can a parent do? Help your child understand that no matter what we have done, we can always come home to God. He is always waiting to joyfully welcome us back.
